Messner currently resides in Santa Barbara, California, with his wife and three children.



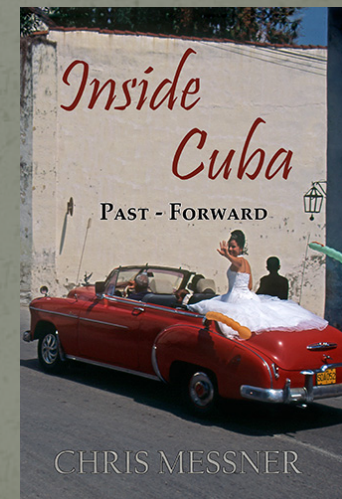
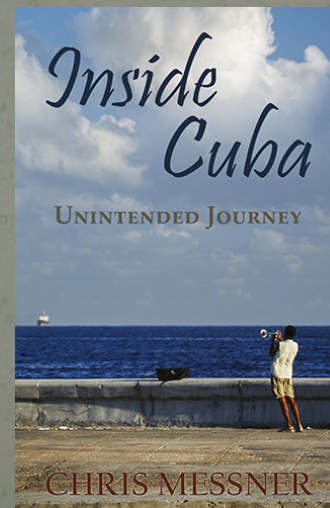
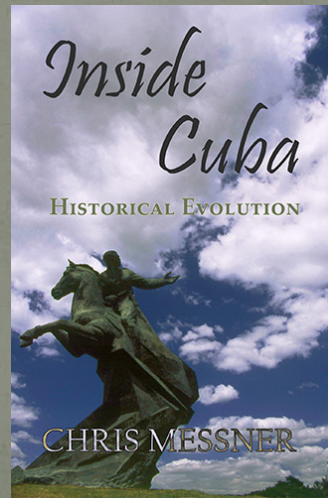
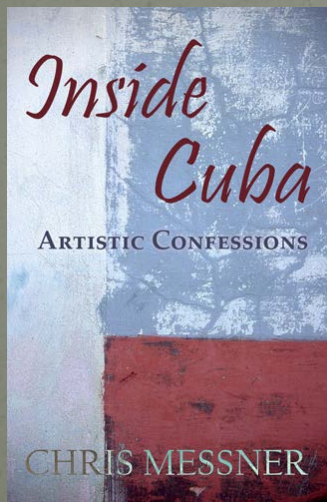
Other Works

Excerpt

SO THERE I was, ready to really see the infamous Bay of Pigs, to see what this battle was about. We were able to drive right up on the sand to see the beachhead and the museum in Girón. I admit, I had preconceived ideas of what it would all be like; it was not quite what I envisioned. The only pictures I had seen of the beach were in documentaries related to the battle. It's a beautiful beach. I thought, *This beachhead is one of the actual places where they landed. Wow! It's hard to imagine that a big battle took place right here in this tranquil pristine place. You could be lying on this beautiful white sand, lying here under some of these coconut palm trees with a light breeze fluttering through the palm fronds, and hearing the light sound of the waves.* Playa Girón was named for a French pirate, Gilbert Girón, who frequented this area at the turn of the sixteenth century. Who could have known that this area would become so famous over three centuries. I stood there in silence and looked around quietly.

Standing here thinking about the history of Cuba, I saw the rhythm of the tides. The tides come in and out and wash the beach clean. Over centuries, many people have explored and colonized Cuba as far back as the Guanajatabey, Sibony, and Taino Indians. Each wave of people brought new changes. When the US embargo ends and the tide goes out, what vacuum will occur? And what exactly will fill it? I thought, *What will happen after Castro?* Many Cubans have known no one other than Fidel Castro, and after all many have come to revere him like a father. When the US embargo ends and Cuba opens, yet another new wave of people will arrive. Major changes will occur, and with them more commercialization. Standing here, it was difficult to believe that I was really in Cuba, again seeing it for what it truly is, the real Cuba, not some portrayal. And I thought, *This thing is bigger than I realized.* At one time this place was the edge of the known world and a major hub for shipping—the United States was not even born yet. During this time, America was undeveloped and unexplored. Ironically, now America is well developed, and Cuba is the unexplored frontier.

I was glad and feeling lucky to be here before the floodgates open. I feel I'm seeing the natural beauty of this land before it becomes developed and commercialized. Once the floodgates are indeed opened, Americans will rush in with gold fever. Collectors will come in, and all the old cars will disappear. In an indirect way, its isolation has given Cuba its unique culture. I saw that culture in the movement of the people—the horses, the carts, the bikes, and the old cars. And I saw it in their music. Cuba's isolation has created unique microcosms at all levels. Even endemic plants and animals are preserved, and in a way, have been protected. Ending the embargo would improve Cuba economically. Sure, I want the people to have a better life. I sensed, though, that the Cuba I was standing in at that moment would become a folkloric memory. I sensed that the Cuban microcosm I was witnessing would not be the same.
